Winter Honey Stores • Warm Weather Alert (Part 2)!

Now that February has arrived it is very important to make sure that your hives have enough food to last until Spring. In most cases the queen is laying eggs and there is brood in the hive. The bees will need extra food to feed the young developing bees. It is a safety measure to place a piece of winter candy directly on top of the top bars very near the cluster. If the bees don't need the winter candy for food they will not touch it; They would rather eat honey than winter candy. Do not take frames out of the hive; It is too early and it could break the cluster chill the bees and queen and cause the hive to perish. Do not add any additional boxes to the hive (supers) until Spring is here. The bees need to cluster tightly to maintain their core temperature and if boxes are added too soon the bees will go up into the boxes when it is a little warmer and when the temperature drops they freeze.

If needed, add a piece or two of winter candy directly on the top bars near the cluster and gently move close to the cluster. Add a 1½"- 2" high spacer-box taped on the top hive box to give room for the bees to access the winter candy. You can also use the spacer for Apigard treatments if you have one, then replace the inner cover and the outer cover to finish. Check every 2 weeks on a warm day by gently raising the back of the inner cover and add winter candy as needed.

The price is \$115 for Northeast New Jersey Beekeepers Association members. A \$40 down payment is required. Call or mail Karl, our treasurer to reserve your nuc. Winter Candy Recipe: 2 cups water, 5 lbs. cane sugar and 1 tbsp. white vinegar.

Mix water, sugar, and white vinegar then heat to 232F using a candy thermometer. Cool to 180F-200F and stir briefly until opaque. Pour into small aluminum pie pans or small cereal boxes lined with wax paper. Let cool before unmolding and store wrapped in wax paper in refrigerator until needed.
