We need the club's beekeeper volunteers to help the students with the hive, give short talks about the bees, help with the harvest etc. These students are the future of beekeeping. Also, this month we are joining with our brother and sister beekeepers of the Morris and Somerset Counties Beekeepers Association and are jointly presenting commercial beekeeper Tim Ives of Ohio at our meeting space. Tim has a unique way of over-wintering in a three-deep configuration. He does no supplemental feeding and does not treat his hives! He also harvests 3 times a season! What is his secret? Come to this meeting to find out. Be sure to take notes.

Besides having cool gear, the purchases of these items helps the club raise funds for the upcoming season and allows us to provide innovative and exciting programs for all of our beekeeper members in the Northeast branch. Message from Lynn Paglia:

These next few weeks are the most critical for the bees in getting them through the winter. Their food requirements double or triple as spring approaches since the Queen is increasing her egg laying and bees can run out of food and starve just days before the spring nectar flow. Check your hives at least once per week to check for fondant on the top bars and hive weight.

The bee club at Ramapo College is well underway. I met with Eric Weiner and two of the students from Ramapo College on February 26 to discuss their vision of the club and preparations for the new hive. The college will be funding the woodenware and supplies for the hive initially through an environmental club on campus called First Step. During the year they will apply to have an actual beekeeping club and money allotted for the club. Art students at the college will be helping to decorate the hive once it has been primed and painted. This will be a full size Langstroth production hive that the students will work on through the year. I have volunteered to be their mentor but if anyone else is interested in helping once the hive is started it would be appreciated. The roll-out for the bees at the college is slated for Earth week. They don't just have one day for earth day they have a whole week! Many students still do not know that there are bees on campus and they feel that now is the time to let the college be informed. They even have a large amount of money already approved for a standardized college sign to be designed and placed near the fenced in area at the Sustainability Center to provide education concerning bees. I will be meeting with the students every week to continue the planning and education process. They are so eager and I am very excited about our new venture as a club.
