## **Club Happenings:**

### Message from Lynn Paglia:

It is now winter. The bees are clustered in their hives eating honey and bee candy and keeping their queen warm. I miss my bees during the winter since they are flying only when the temperature is warm enough 45-50 and for a very short period of time. The bees must be kept dry and have enough food to sustain them until Spring. In late Fall I gave all of my hives a small piece of winter candy and made sure that they were heavy with honey. Some hives have eaten the winter candy and the honey at the same time and some hives have left the winter candy alone and don't seem to want it at all. I put little blocks of winter candy in as an insurance policy so that the hives that want it will have it but never as a replacement for the hive being heavy with honey. The hive boxes should not be disturbed when it is cold-the bees have sealed the boxes together with propolis to keep the hive as airtight as possible and doing an inspection in the winter while the bees are in cluster can cause the cluster to be broken and the bees to die. The best way to check a hive is to lift the back of the hive. If the hive is heavy the bees should have ample honey stores. If you gave the bees winter candy on top of the bars of the top box the easiest way to check is to gently lift the back of the inner cover to see if the bees have eaten the winter candy. If they have you can place another piece of candy where the bees are not clustered and gently move it into the cluster. I always keep the screened bottom boards open on full size hives in the winter-it increases ventilation and decreases moisture buildup in the hive.

It is at this time of year that the preparation is started for Spring. If you are starting a new hive you must order your supplies (hive boxes, frames, wax, other necessary bee equipment, and the bees.) Brushy Mountain Bee Farm has free shipping until December 20th when you order \$100 or more. That is a great deal since bee equipment can be very heavy and costly to ship. Kelley has 15% off orders until December 16th. There are many bee suppliers in New Jersey. It is best to get local bees and January is the time to get on the wait lists for the bees that will be ready for sale in the Spring. If you need help with bee equipment selection and Bee Suppliers I would be more than happy to help you. (845-558-1921). Ramapo College is preparing for Spring with the bees too. I have spoken with Dr. Weiner and there is great interest among the students to form a club and work with the bees on campus regularly. I am meeting with Dr. Weiner and the students in the next 2-3 weeks to see what I can do to help mentor the club and other classes that are interested in visiting the hives. This is very exciting and is taking one more step toward integrating beekeeping into the college scenery and curriculum.
