### A story from Scott Jenkins, son of NEBA members Bob & Rita Jenkins, who is in Rwanda in the Peace Corps:

My name is Scott Jenkins, and I'm a member of the New Jersey Beekeepers Association currently serving in Rwanda as an education volunteer for the Peace Corps. My site, however, is more than a bit unusual for that kind of post; unlike the crowded secondary schools where most of my colleagues work, I was assigned to teach English at a small vocational college for conservation and environmental management. My students are rangers and park workers, and as such the school was built on the border of Nyungwe Forest, a montane rainforest that is one of Rwanda's three national parks. The school is closely associated with the Rwanda Development Board (RDB) and the Wildlife Conservation Society (WCS), both of which have long been involved in the establishment of a series of beekeeping cooperatives all around the edge of the forest. Kitabi, the village in which I'll be living for the next two years, is home to one of these cooperatives (a fact that more than likely was one of the reasons the Peace Corps assigned me to this area). I have only just arrived recently but I've had the chance to meet with the leader of the cooperative, a man so dedicated to the cause that he is known primarily as "Kayuki" ('kah-yoo-chee,'which means 'little bee' in the local language of Kinyarwanda), and offered to help out in any way I can while I'm here. While my official job description is just teaching English, the Peace Corps encourages their volunteers to pursue secondary projects that they are passionate about so I look forward to getting more involved as time goes by. I also took a short walk down the road towards the forest in order to visit the shop in which the beekeepers sell their goods to people passing through the forest, as well as one the clearings where they keep their hives (an interesting assortment of traditional log hives, top bar, and even a couple modern frame hives). Beekeeping has a long history in this part of the world, but recently it's become a bit of an old man's game. There is a strong desire to try to get the youth involved in the business, albeit without many promising successes so far. I've also heard talk of a push to incorporate more Western hives, but the cost of materials and proper training to use them can often be prohibitive for smaller groups. I hope to be working closely with the beekeepers here for the next two years, with plenty more updates to come!
