

## Message from the President:

Happy July Northeast NJ Beekeepers!

July means two things to a beekeeper: 1) Honey Harvest 2) Mite Treatments

The nectar flow is over and now is the time to see how much honey your bees made for you. If you are a new Beekeeper, remember is it not uncommon for your bees to have only made enough honey for themselves and none for you. When you realize that it takes 8 pounds of honey to make 1 pound

of wax, then it's easy to understand how productive your bees really were as they drew out all the comb in theirs and your new hive.

Now, for those of us who did get honey, enjoy the sweet stickiness of success! I always enjoy extracting my honey, at least for the first hour and after it's all done and cleaned up. Seriously, extracting is time consuming, sticky work. My advice is always to pace yourself and take breaks to give yourself a rest and a chance to clean up all the gooey glistening puddles.

Also, please be alert, because the wax moth is the extractor's primo enemy. When you pull your supers, make sure you extract within a few days or your harvest could be completely ruined by wax moths. After all the hard work you and your bees have put in to get a honey harvest, nothing and I mean nothing is worse than seeing it all destroyed by wax moth slime.

Once you have extracted, it will be time to start thinking about mite treatments. Tim Schuler spoke about the success of ApiVar at our last meeting, and if you have not already used it this year, then I would strongly encourage you to make it your treatment of choice. If you have used it this year, or if your nuc was treated with it, then I'd advise you to use MAQs and/or ApiGuard. I treated my hives with ApiVar in early spring, and after I pull my supers, I am going to first use 1/2 treatment of MAQs (1 patty per hive) and sometime in August, a 1/2 treatment of ApiGuard. Last year, I used multiple types of treatments and my bees were the strongest coming out of winter that I've ever seen. I will use ApiVar again in the early spring, February to early March, so I am using the most effective treatment when I have the smallest number of bees, which should ensure a zero mite count as the colony explodes with growth.

We have a lot to talk about, and I'm sure this Friday's meeting will have lots and lots of good discussions. I look forward to seeing you and doing my best to get you answers to all your questions.

# **Buckfast Queens For Sale**

The club is bringing in a limited number of Buckfast Queens from Ferguson Apiaries of Hensall, Canada. The queens will be here around July 27th and will cost \$40 per queen.

For over 50 years, Ferguson Apiaries has exclusively bred Buckfast bees, originally developed by Brother Adam at the Buckfast Abbey in England. All of the Ferguson Apiaries stock has

been produced from the Buckfast line acquired from breeders in Ontario, Denmark, and England. The Ferguson stock has been through the very cold Ontario winters, and has been hygienic tested over the past 20 years. Ferguson Apiaries continually works hard to develop and cultivate the best lines to build gentle, productive, and mite resistant Honeybee stock.

The club will be bringing in a limited number of queens, and due to the high demand, all queens are on a first deposit, first served basis.

If you want to reserve a queen, you have to give a \$20 deposit per queen to Bob Jenkins. **Please** make checks payable to:
